# MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The year 2021 was one in which the field hockey community returned to play. At first with many restrictions, including playing while masked at the National Indoor Tournament, and as the sport moved outside with growing momentum. We experienced a huge rebound in playing numbers and on many occasions, we heard individual stories of how important the sport is in people's lives, to their identity, to their sense of purpose and the overall importance of being part of a team. The absence of field hockey during the times of the pandemic reinforced the value of it to society.

Domestically it was a joy to see the amazing return and thriving National Indoor Tournament, Regional and National Club Championships and the evolved Olympic Development Pathway – Nexus. Internationally, there remained much disruption. The postponement of much of the FIH Hockey Pro League and the FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup in South Africa in December led to much understandable disappointment with the elite groups. The travel complexities when tournaments could be played provided much greater challenges to the athletes, coaches and managers for the groups representing USA. Especially for the Junior Pan American Championships in Chile in June and the FIH Hockey Men's Junior World Cup in India in November. Hosting an international tournament behind closed doors also came with increased challenges. We took on that task with our partners at The Training Center in Pennsylvania in June to host the men's and women's Indoor Pan American Cups. Much credit to all those involved and especially to the athletes who represented USA with pride and qualified for both the men's and women's FIH Indoor Hockey World Cups and men's and women's FIH Hockey Junior World Cups.

Over the summer, we took the next step in our long-term partnership to establish a Hockey Headquarters for the sport. After an extensive search process, we committed to an ambitious partnership with the United States Performance Center (USPC) in North Carolina. The vision of the USPC is to build a world class, multi-sport center bringing together top-notch facilities and sport science practitioners for Olympic Sports in the greater Charlotte area. In the first phase, our U.S. Women's National Team rebased to Bessant Field in Charlotte and began working with the support staff of the USPC. This project is for the whole sport and as it evolves, opportunities for the men's program, development, junior athletes and more will follow.

In 2020, as COVID descended on the world, USA Field Hockey pivoted our strategy to focus on program delivery where appropriate. In 2021 as we learned to move on, we focused on expanding programming as well as returning to executing on elements of the 2017-2024 Strategic Plan – expanding State Chapters, increasing Coach Education opportunities, building out Safe Sport education, evolving the Olympic Development Pathway, establishing relationships with new partners - all areas with much progress. Much credit goes to the committed and hardworking staff, and supportive guidance and oversight from the Board of USA Field Hockey.

# TEAM USA

The No. 23 U.S. Men's National Team dove into training in September with Open Trial Weekends. Following the naming of a new squad, the group traveled to Europe for a seven-day tour in October before having a Pan American Cup Selection Camp in December. USA hosted Canada for a two-game series in December.

The No. 15 U.S. Women's National Team continued the 2020-21 FIH Hockey Pro League season with four more games. The third season picked up in October but USA does not have a match until 2022. In November, USA hosted Canada for a five-game series in Chula Vista, Calif.

The U-21 USMNT competed in the Junior Pan American Championship in Santiago, Chile in August. Defeating Canada in a shootout to claim bronze, they ultimately failed to directly qualify as only the top-two men's team advanced, but they got the call up to the FIH Hockey Junior World Cup in September.

The U-21 USWNT prepared for the Junior Pan American Championship by hosting Chile for a four-game series in June and July. They claimed bronze at the event and qualified for the FIH Hockey Junior World Cup in December but it was postponed until 2022.

USA Field Hockey hosted the Indoor Pan American Cup in Spring City, Pa. in June where both the U.S. Men's and Women's National Indoor Teams competed. The women defended their title by defeating Canada to punch their ticket to the FIH Hockey Indoor World Cup while the men fell short dropping the qualification match to Argentina. In December, the men were invited following the announcement that Australia and New Zealand would not participate due to COVID-related government travel restrictions.

In March 2020, it was announced that USA Field Hockey would host the 2021 World Masters Hockey (WMH) Masters Indoor World Cup originally in Spring City, Pa. from March 10 to 14. Unfortunately this event was postponed to February 2022 in Virginia Beach, Va. WMH postponed the Masters World Cups to 2022.

# U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

In April, following an extensive search, Harendra (Harry) Singh was named the new head coach of the No. 23 U.S. Men's National Team. Singh filled out his staff by adding Pat Harris (July) and Jun Kentwell (September) as his assistant coaches and Kathy Schiller (July) as the junior and senior teams manager.

The squad hosted two Open Trial Weekends in September, which were held in conjunction with Junior and Senior USMNT training camps. The Open Trials were for athletes interested in consideration for the USMNT or Development Team. Singh named new squads following those events.

In October, the USMNT traveled to Germany and Austria for their first training and practices matches since their last tour to South Africa in January 2020.

The USMNT met in December for a Pan American Cup Selection Camp which followed with a two-game series against No. 11 Canada, both in Moorpark, Calif. The first game was unofficial but resulted in a 3-3 tie. In the second game, which was FIH Sanctioned, USA captured the lead with time expired at the end of the half but Canada rallied and scored two in the third quarter for the 2-1 win.

# U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The No. 15 U.S. Women's National Team continued the 2020-21 FIH Hockey Pro League season with four more games in May, all taking place in Europe.

To restart, the USWNT traveled to Antwerp where they played No. 12 Belgium for two games. In the first meeting after a scoreless first quarter, the Red Panthers tallied once in each of the remaining frames to defeat USA, 3-0. The second game saw Belgium produce a strong scoring performance, where they scored six goals across the second and third quarters, for the 6-1 win.

In London, England, the USWNT met No. 5 Great Britain in a double-header. While the first game saw USA hold an experienced Team GB until the end of the first quarter, the hosts capitalized on multiple scoring chances and turnovers to defeat USA, 5-1. In the second contest, Great Britain possessed much of the game as they capitalized on three penalty corners and two field goals for the 5-0 win.

The third season picked up in October but USA does not have a match until 2022.

As part of preparation before the Pan American Cup in January 2022, the USWNT hosted No. 13 Canada for a five-game series in Chula Vista, Calif. in November. The first three games were unofficial while the final two were FIH Sanctioned.

# MEN'S JUNIOR HIGH PERFORMANCE

The Junior U.S. Men's National Teams had an active second half of the year. All teams competed in the first-ever Young Men's National Championship from June 15 to 20 in Virginia Beach, Va. Following, the U-22 USMNT hosted a 3-Nations Series with Chile and Mexico from June 26 to July 1 in Moorpark, Calif.

In July, Pat Harris was named the U-21 USMNT Head Coach and in that same month there was an All-Teams Training Camp, where immediately following the newly selected 2022 Junior U.S. Men's National Teams were named.

The U-22 USMNT competed in the Junior Pan American Championship (JPAC) from August 21 to 28 in Santiago, Chile, with the goal to qualify for the FIH Odisha Hockey Men's Junior World Cup (JWC). USA finished second in their pool with Argentina and Trinidad and Tobago before falling to Chile, 4-0, in the semifinals. In the 3rd/4th place game, USA brought home the bronze after beating Canada in a shootout. This was the second time in tournament history that USA won bronze, with the first coming in 2008.

Although not directly qualifying from the JPAC, in September the U-22 USMNT got the invite to the JWC from November 24 to December 5 in Bhubaneswar, India, after being the first reserve team from the Pan American Hockey Federation. USA was put in a tough pool, falling to Spain, 17-0; Korea, 5-1; and The Netherlands, 14-0. In first consolation match, they were defeated by Pakistan, 18-2; and then topped by Canada, 4-0. In the 15th/16th place game, USA was trailing 0-2 heading into the final quarter but produced an impressive comeback to tie the match in the final minute of regulation and defeat Egypt in a shootout.

# WOMEN'S JUNIOR HIGH PERFORMANCE

The Junior U.S. Women's National Teams started their competition year in June, with all teams competing in the Young Women's National Championship from June 15 to 20 in Virginia Beach, Va. Following, the U-22 USWNT hosted Chile in a four-game series from June 30 to July 4 in Harrisonburg, Va.

The U-22 USWNT competed in the Junior Pan American Championship (JPAC) from August 21 to 28 in Santiago, Chile, with the goal to qualify for the FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup (JWC). USA finished first in their pool with Chile and Trinidad and Tobago, before falling to Uruguay, 1-0, in the semifinals. In the 3rd/4th place game, USA met familiar opponent Chile. Tied 1-1 after regulation, it went down to the final round of the shootout for USA to prevail and qualify for the JWC. During the Awards Ceremony, two USA athletes received honors for their performance during the JPAC. Charlotte de Vries earned Top Scorer, recording five goals, and Hope Rose was named Most Valuable Player. USA has won JPAC bronze twice before, 1998 and 2012, since the tournament's inception in 1988.

Although the JWC was set to take place December 5 to 16 in Potchefstroom, South Africa, the event was postponed to April 2022 because of the outbreak of the new coronavirus variant, Omicron.

# U.S. NATIONAL INDOOR TEAMS

USA Field Hockey hosted the Indoor Pan American Cup (IPAC) at The Training Center in Spring City, Pa. from June 25 to 27, where both the U.S. Men's and Women's National Indoor Teams competed for a chance to qualify for the FIH Hockey Indoor World Cup (IWC).

Three men's teams competed in a double round robin format with no cross-overs, only classification matches. No. 42 USA split results on the first day, falling to No. 20 Argentina, 4-3, then defeating No. 15 Canada, 6-1. Day two had similar outcomes, losing to No. 20 Argentina, 4-1, and then topping No. 15 Canada, 5-1.

Set in the IPAC Final with No. 20 Argentina, USA let it all out on the court falling to Los Leones, 4-2, and missing out on FIH Hockey Indoor World Cup qualification. At the conclusion of the event, Pat Harris earned the men's IPAC Top Scorer. In December, the men were invited to attend the IWC following the announcement that Australia and New Zealand would not participate due to COVID-related government travel restrictions.

Five women's teams competed in a single round robin format with no cross-overs, only classification matches. No. 12 USA started the first day with two wins over Guyana, 20-2, and No. 17 Canada, 5-4. The second day posed a challenge when they faced a tough No. 21 Uruguay but held on for the 2-1 win. Next, they battled No. 15 Argentina to a 3-3 tie, with Las Leonas scoring a time expired penalty corner.

No. 12 USA defeated No. 17 Canada, 3-0, in the final to defend their Indoor Pan American Cup title and qualify for the IWC. During the awards ceremony, Hope Rose earned women's IPAC Top Scorer of the Tournament and Ashley Sessa was named Most Valuable Player of the Tournament.

The Pan American Hockey Federation named the 2021 Pan American Indoor Elite Teams in December. Named to the men's team was Pat Harris, Aki Kaeppler and Jonathan Klages, and to the women's team was Ali Campbell, Hope Rose and Ashley Sessa.

# U.S. MASTERS TEAMS

Both the U.S. Men's and Women's Masters Teams named their respective training squads at the start of 2020, ahead of what was going to be the 2021 World Masters Hockey (WMH) World Cup events. With the pandemic and after lengthy consideration, WMH unanimously decided to postpone the Masters World Cups to 2022. USA will be sending teams to Nottingham, England from August 12 to 21; Cape Town, South Africa from October 1 to 10; and Tokyo, Japan from October 19 to 29 to participate.

In March 2020, it was announced that USA Field Hockey would host the 2021 WMH Masters Indoor World Cup originally in Spring City, Pa. from March 10 to 14. Unfortunately this event was postponed to February 2022 in Virginia Beach, Va.

The U.S. Masters Teams used 2021 to prepare for the rescheduled events in 2022.

# MEMBERSHIP

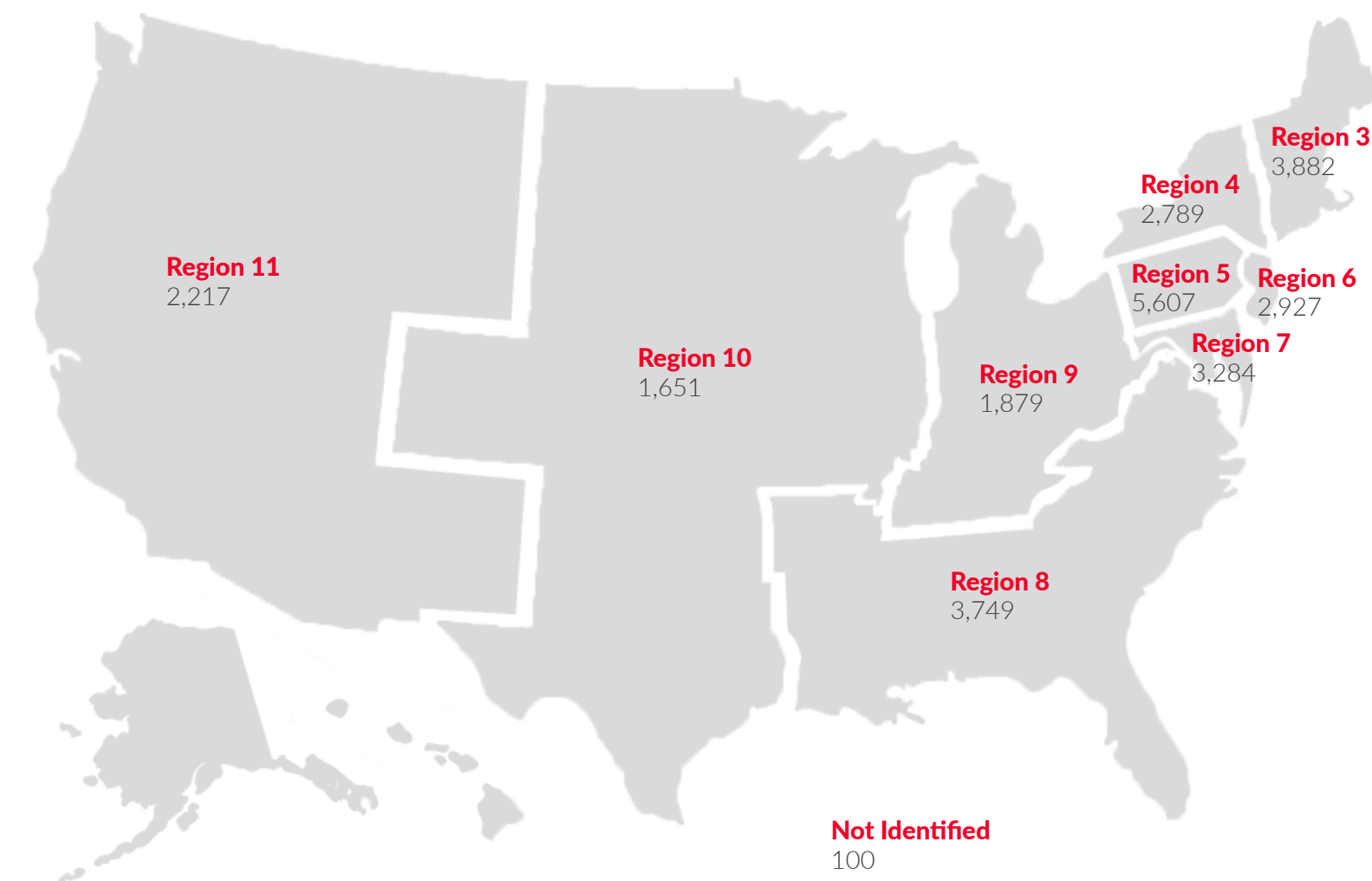

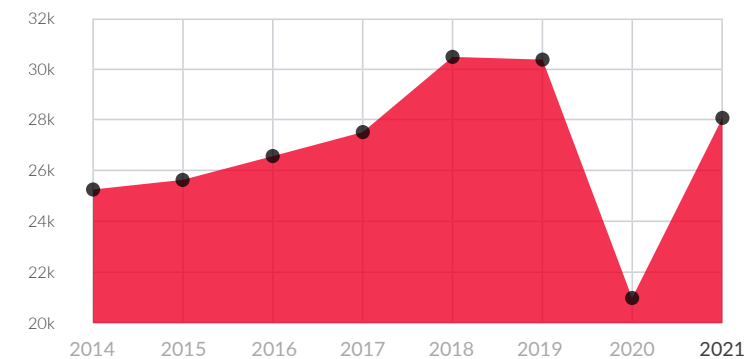


## MEMBERSHIP IN 2021

# OLYMPIC DEVELOPMENT PATHWAY & NEXUS

Nexus, USA Field Hockey's Olympic Development Pathway Program, launched its inaugural season in the spring of 2021. Due to continued pandemic modifications, the Nexus season was condensed to run from April to June, with the premier event, the Nexus Championship, held in early July. USA Field Hockey worked tirelessly throughout 2020 and early 2021 to create the framework that is Nexus. Looking to take lessons from years of the Futures program and create an environment for players that is centered around a camp style format and rich in the principles of the game.

The Nexus Staff, along with the Coach Education Department, standardized the coaching resources available and spent countless hours prepping for the season. The catalyst for the rebuild was focused on "The USA Way", the framework for how USA Field Hockey thinks about

the game of field hockey and provides a vision and common language to use across the country.

In September, USA Field Hockey and the Nexus Staff restructured the format to include Regional Management Teams. To best serve all athletes and families, the organization moved to a Super Regional Team approach which consists of an administrative manager and a coach manager. With that, an entirely new team of Regional Managers were hired who immediately got started building out the program for 2022.

In December, the Commercial Department secured Osaka Hockey as the presenting sponsor of Nexus effective immediately and running through the 2024 Nexus Championship.

## NEXUS SELECTION CAMPS

JUNE 5-13, 2021 | VARIOUS LOCATIONS

The Nexus Selection Camps took place in early June. These events, that replaced the original Regional Futures Tournaments, were "invite only" to the top 40% of athletes across each Super Region. By bringing two regions together for the event, the competition level was raised. These camps were run similarly to regular Nexus Training Weekends. The staff on site were asked to play a dual role of coach and selector to evaluate and advance the best athletes forward to Nexus Championship. Together with the Junior High Performance Staff, Nexus utilized an outside data analytics expert to develop an application to track all assessments. Athletes were reviewed following their regional participation and again at Selection Camps (if applicable). This data was used to rank and advance players forward at each step.

The first Nexus Championship, presented by Harrow Sports, took place in July and was held at the Virginia Beach Regional Training Center in Virginia Beach, Va. Approximately 700 athletes across three age divisions descended on the complex from July 6 to 14 for a chance to advance within the Olympic Development Pathway. These events included Selection Camps along with the AAU Junior Olympic Games.

# REGIONAL & NATIONAL EVENTS

In 2021, USA Field Hockey was able to host majority of the normally scheduled regional and national events.

With travel restrictions and cross state mandates still in effect during the 2020-21 National Indoor Tournament Qualifiers (NITQ), presented by YOLO Sportswear, the Events Department decided not to host them but rather use a different approach for qualification for the U-16 Girls and U-19 Girls divisions into the 2022 National Indoor Tournament (NIT), presented by YOLO Sportswear. Each club that registered to attend the NITQ was granted one team spot into the designated division at the NIT. The remaining NIT spots for the U-16 Girls and U-19 Girls divisions were based on the qualifying percentage between the teams entered into the

NITQ and the qualified number of teams in the NIT from 2019 and 2020. For example, if a club had six teams in the U-19 Girls NITQ in 2019 and 2020 and qualified three teams to the NIT in those years, they would receive 50% allocation of the 2021 teams submitted into this year's NITQ.

To accommodate not having the NITQ, USA Field Hockey added more teams to the NIT. Unfortunately, the U-18 Boys, Men's and Women's divisions were unable to occur in 2021. All NIT events required masks, social distancing, back-to-back games and a built in 20-minute buffer for teams to clear the venue.

USA Field Hockey made the decision to cancel the inaugural 2021 National Indoor Festival (NIF), presented by YOLO Sportswear. This event, which was set to provide additional playing opportunities for all during the indoor season, was to take place February 13 to 15 at the Virginia Beach Sports Center in Virginia Beach, Va.

# COACH EDUCATION

In 2021, USA Field Hockey's Coach Education Program looked forward to getting back to delivering in-person clinics and being back on the field again. As many transitioned out of the various pandemic restrictions, the Coach Education and Learning team continued to deliver online programs in combination with existing and new in-person content.

## EVENT COACH DEVELOPMENT

With the introduction of the new Nexus program, the Coach Education and Learning team was on hand to support coaches delivering Nexus throughout the regions. In a series of online coaching webinars, key areas of emphasis were highlighted to help coaches deliver engaging, fun sessions while presenting consistent, philosophically aligned content. Coaches attending the Nexus Championship in Virginia Beach, Va. were also provided individual support and feedback by a team of USA Field Hockey Coach Educators. The individual coach feedback was very well received and proved impactful for personal development.

Other coach development opportunities were held at the Young Men's and Women's National Championship at which team coaches had the chance to be filmed as they coached and had feedback and reflection sessions with coach educators. At the AAU Junior Olympic Games in Houston, Texas, Nicky Hitchens was on hand to provide coach support and Valerie Lohr attended in a newly introduced role of Student-Athlete Welfare Coach.

## VIRTUAL CONNECTIONS

As the Coach Education and Learning Team worked through various travel and gathering restrictions, they continued to utilize their Slack channel, which now has more than 900 coaches signed up to stay connected. Regular "Cuppa Chats" continued throughout the year providing opportunity for coaches to meet, share and discuss a variety of topics. Another coach's favorite was the college coach panel discussion in which NCAA Championship winner Tracey Fuchs (Northwestern University) was joined by Nikki Parsley-Blocker (Liberty University) and Meredith Civico (Rutgers University) as they discussed the highs and lows of their seasons.

# UMPIRE EDUCATION

In 2021, USA Field Hockey was fortunate to be able to supply enough umpires to cover all the events held. Some of the events had challenges to secure the appropriate numbers, but that was a common theme across all sports because of the pandemic as well as the huge reduction in officials.

Recruitment of umpires is a continual struggle for USA Field Hockey for various reasons. The Umpire Membership saw an increase from the previous year, gaining 145 new or renewed members. This could be factored into regional and national events happening again.

The Umpire Department continued to utilize virtual training in 2021. There were six 1.5-hour sessions that included Outdoor, Indoor and Advanced Umpire trainings. These sessions were run at different times throughout the year and were attended by almost 600 participants. A continued struggle for the Umpire Department is to find the appropriate venue for "on-field" practice and training before placing beginner umpires in highly competitive environments. All participants of the virtual trainings were given information to contact their local umpire groups to have the chance to get on the field for practice and instruction.

On the international stage, many umpires and technical officials were quite active. USA had representation at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games with Maggie Giddens as an umpire, Steve Horgan as umpire manager and Rene Zelkin as technical official. There were also many appointments within the events of the Pan American Hockey Federation. Along with that, several umpires and technical staff were appointed to work gold medal matches this past year. These individuals have dedicated themselves to USA Field Hockey above and beyond the general population and represent USA very well around the world.

# SPORT DEVELOPMENT

USA Field Hockey continues to focus its sport development efforts on supporting and growing field hockey as a sport for all, a sport for life. Here is a summary of sport development initiatives designed to drive growth of field hockey:

## YOUTH

USA Field Hockey continued to add tools and resources to support youth development. The USA Field Hockey Equipment Store is stocked with ADM Equipment at affordable prices on items such as wood and plastic sticks, GO Balls (oversized lightweight balls perfect for beginners), GO Cards (decks of 50 field hockey games), Squistles (squeeze whistles) and more.

### DISCOVER FIELD HOCKEY CLINICS | 24 HELD IN 2021, 875 KIDS

These 90-minute introductory clinics, delivered by local programs and coaches, for boys and girls who have never participated in field hockey previously or have had limited exposure to the sport.

### PLAY LA | 280 KIDS

Four small clinics were held in the one day event that resulted in 280 kids participating and being introduced to field hockey.

## HIGH SCHOOL

USA Field Hockey's partnership with the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) continues to improve the connection and communication between the organizations and field hockey leaders of states with high school field hockey leagues. The High School Advocacy Group continues to meet regularly to address high school growth opportunities.

## COLLEGE

The 2021 NCAA Division I Field Hockey Semifinals and Final were held at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Mich. on November 19 and 21, and USA Field Hockey worked with Michigan State Chapter leaders to hold multiple events designed to support the local field hockey community and drive attendance to the games. There was a social, Defending Principles Workshop, Level 1 Instructional Coaching Clinic, Umpiring the Modern Game course and Youth Clinic and Autograph Session.

## STATE CHAPTERS

USA Field Hockey continues to roll out a system of regional representation in the form of State Chapters. These groups are volunteer-led extensions of USA Field Hockey, designed to support existing field hockey and fuel grassroots growth.

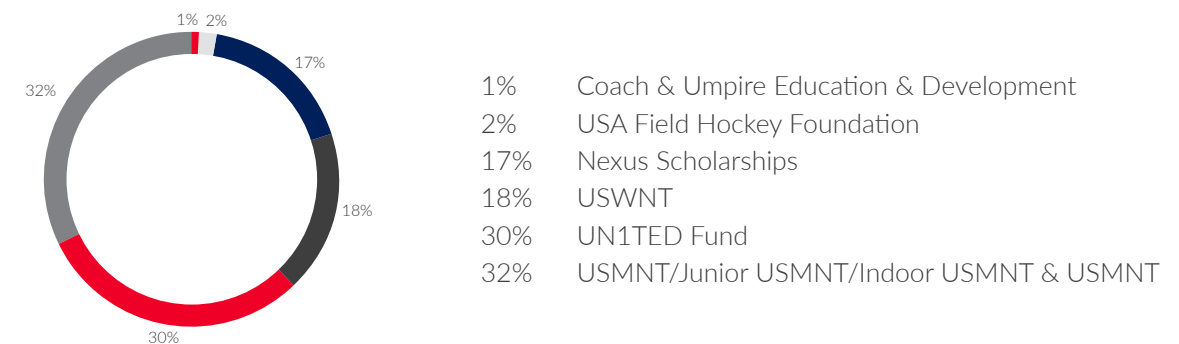
