### Olympic Beach Volleyball Quick Facts

- 24 Teams per gender; two teams maximum per gender, per country
- Men's competition is Aug. 6-18 (13 days)
- Women's competition is Aug. 6-17 (12 days)
- Stadium capacity: 12,000
- Copacabana Beach: 2.4 miles long; Sand is naturally from Copacabana Beach. Court is 16x8m. Net height: 2.43m Men; 2.24m Women
- 16 countries in the men's field; 17 in the women's field. Total of 22 different countries playing in 2016 Games

- USA has one referee of the 16 for beach volleyball at the 2016 Olympic Games, Dan Apol. Dan cannot officiate matches which USA plays
- Six pools with four teams each. One match per day, every other day
- Top two ranked teams in each pool advance to the single elimination round (Round of 16)
- The best two teams that rank third in their pool advance to the single elimination round (based on match points, then set ratio)
- The four remaining third-ranked pool teams will play lucky loser (3rd vs 6th; 4th vs 5th) to advance
- The fourth ranked team in each pool is eliminated

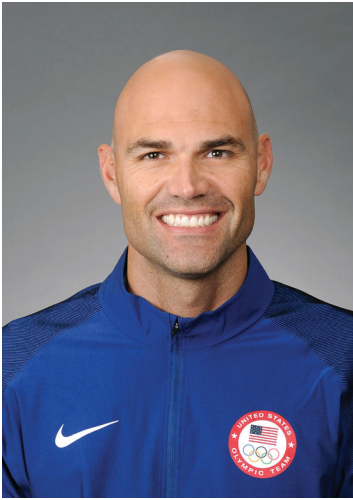

- Pair is 3-1 against Barbara/Agatha, last win was July 2015 in Gstaad, Switzerland 21-17, 23-21
- Duo's 150th team win was on Aug. 14 vs AUS Bawden/Clancy, also in Rio
- Pair's 100th team victory was vs Borger/Buthe GER in the semifinals of the Rio Grand Slam March 12, 2016
- The round of 16 was the first meeting of opponent Italy Marta Menegatti/Laura Giombini
- In Olympic pool play, the pair went 3-0, beating Australia, China and Switzerland
- The set lost against Switzerland Aug. 10 was only the second set ever lost for Walsh Jennings at the Olympics, the first was Aug. 1, 2012 vs Austria Schwaiger/Schwaiger 17-21, 21-8, 15-10 (pool play)
- At the Moscow Grand Slam, April/Kerri beat Brazil's Talita Antunes/Larissa Franca for the first time and now trail the series 2-1 (previous: March 20, Vitoria, Brazil for Gold medal; Aug. 23, Long Beach, Calif., for Gold medal)
- Duo met Olympic qualification requirements on May 18
- Silver at the Vitoria Open (March 20) advanced them to the top-ranked U.S. women's team in rankings
- Gold at the Moscow Grand Slam advanced them to No. 3 in Olympic rankings
- Their 2015 season ended at the Rio Open (9h place, Sept. 5), and following Kerri's fifth shoulder surgery, duo returned to play at the Rio Grand Slam (1st, March 13, 2016)

- Eliminated by Brazil's Alison/Bruno Schmidt in the quarterfinals, Brazil now leads the series 3-2
- Versus Rd of 16 Austria opponent Alexander Huber/Robin Seidl, they are now 3-0
- In Olympic pool play, pair went 3-0 with wins against Tunisia, Mexico, Italy
- Duo lead 2016 World Tour in winning percentage (88.5%)
- Duo satisfied their Olympic qualification requirements at the Moscow Grand Slam
- Phil/Nick became the top ranked U.S. team in Olympic rankings on May 23, following a bronze at the Cincinnati Open (May 21)
- The pair joined mid-way through the Olympic qualification process, their first event together was a silver at the Long Beach Grand Slam (Aug. 23, 2015)
- Duo finished silver at the inaugural FIVB World Tour Finals, finish did not count toward Olympic points
- Phil/Nick previously teamed together from 2003-05
- Nick is married to Florida State beach volleyball head coach Brooke Niles, the couple have one son
- Phil was born in Baden, Switzerland but moved to the United States when he was one years old, he has always held American citizenship

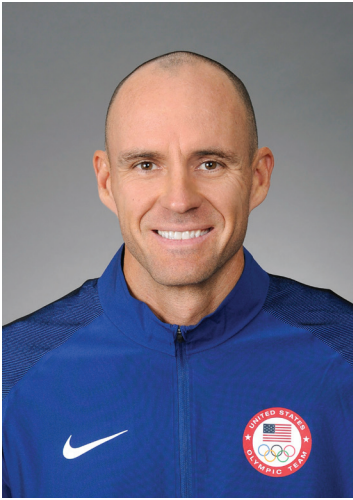

## OLYMPIC GAMES - U.S. QUALIFICATION PROCESS

Began on the FIVB World Tour, April 21, 2015 and closed on June 12, 2016. There are a total of 24 teams per gender at the Olympic Games, countries can have a maximum of two teams per gender.

The 15 highest ranking teams on the Olympic Ranking List on June 12, earned their country a quota spot, with a maximum of two quota spots per country.

Teams must have participated in a minimum of 12 FIVB tournaments with their teammate from the Jan. 1, 2015 - June 12, 2016 time frame.

Teams must be one of the top two in the Rankings to qualify their country a quota spot.

Brazil earned one quota spot in each gender as the Olympic host country. Brazil then earned its second quota spots in each gender following winning the FIVB Beach World Championships in 2015, on both the men's and women's sides.

## USA AT THE OLYMPICS

- The U.S. has won gold at every Olympic beach showing, either men/women, since the sports inception in 1996

- The U.S. has the most gold medals out of any country and a total of nine medals, Brazil leads with 11 medals
- USA has placed two teams on the podium on three occasions.

## RECORD SETTINGS AT THE 2016 OLYMPICS

- For the 2016 Rio Olympic Games, Kerri Walsh Jennings is going for her fourth gold medal, which would make her just the third American ever to win four gold in one event for a team sport (Teresa Edwards basketball 1984-2000; Lisa Leslie basketball 1996-2008).

- If Walsh Jennings wins gold, she will be the fourth woman ever, and second American, to win four consecutive in a team sport (Jayna Hefford, Canada, hockey; Hayley Wickenheiser, Canada, hockey; Lisa Leslie, U.S., basketball).

- If Walsh Jennings medals, she will be the most decorated beach athlete (male or female) in the sport; she currently is tied with Misty May-Treanor for three medals (all gold) and Emanuel Rego and Ricardo Santos of Brazil who each have gold, silver and bronze. No one had two gold medals before the pair earned their second in Beijing (2008) and no woman had three medals of any color before London (2012).

## BEACH VOLLEYBALL AT THE 2016 OLYMPICS

- In total, there are 96 athletes competing in beach volleyball during the Olympics
  - 48 men/24 teams
  - 48 women/24 teams
- 15 teams earned their country a quota spot via the Olympic rankings
- One quota spot per gender were given to the host country (Brazil)
- One quota spot per gender was given to the 2015 FIVB Beach World Championships winners (Brazil M&W)
- Five teams per gender entered the Olympics after earning spots through their Continental Cup
  - One quota spot per confederation is available
- Two teams per gender entered the Olympics after earning spots from the FIVB Continental Cup Finals
  - The second and third place National Federation from the Continental Cup qualify to play in the Finals

## PREVIEW OF THE 2016 U.S. OLYMPIC BEACH VOLLEYBALL TEAM

Rio de Janeiro's iconic Copacabana Beach will serve as the site of the beach volleyball competition at the 2016 Olympic Games. The U.S. Olympic Beach Volleyball Team will look to continue its storybook history of taking the gold, which saw Americans reach the top of the podium at every Olympic Games since beach volleyball was added to the Olympic program in 1996.

This time around, the United States is sending two men's and women's teams to the Olympics that are new partnerships in the quadrennial. Among the 24 teams per gender at the Olympics, 2008 Gold Medalist Phil Dalhausser and Nick Lucena will be seeded third in the men's competition. The pair led the World Tour in 2016 with an 88.5-win percentage and are 31-10 against Olympic qualified teams.

Two-time Olympian Jake Gibb and Casey Patterson were close behind their compatriots in the rankings and will enter the Olympics seeded sixth overall. The pair are 40-37 against Olympic qualified teams and have continued to have success in tournaments leading up to the Olympics.

April Ross and Kerri Walsh Jennings battled through Walsh Jennings' shoulder injury and recovery to gain the top American spot in the rankings, finishing qualification with the third seed for the Games. In their last three events of qualification, the duo won gold on three occasions and they currently sit with an impressive 54-15 record against Olympic qualified teams. Ross and Walsh Jennings make up the only pair on the 2016 U.S. Olympic Beach Volleyball Team where both partners have Olympic experience, Ross a 2012 Silver Medalist and Walsh Jennings, a four-time Olympian and three-time Gold Medalist.

Lauren Fendrick and Brooke Sweat will be making their Olympic debut together and as the only U.S. duo in 2016 where both partners are debuting at the Games. The pair secured their berth at the final event of Olympic qualification and will enter the Olympics as the 15-seed. Against a similar field to the Olympic competition, Fendrick and Sweat finished fifth at the 2015 FIVB Beach World Championships.

Each nation can send up to four teams to the 2016 Olympic Games, two per gender. Selection to the U.S. team was based on the pairs' results in FIVB international events and Olympic qualifying rankings.

## FUN FAST FACTS RIO 2016 BEACH VOLLEYBALL

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil - Opening ceremonies is August 5 and the U.S. Olympic Beach Volleyball Team will begin the 2016 Olympics on Saturday at Copacabana Beach.

The biggest names in the sport are on hand as current stars ready to begin play and Olympians from prior Games join the contingent as experts on the sidelines and in the broadcasting booths.

Below is information to catch you up on beach volleyball at the Rio Olympics before Saturday's first serve of the Games. Women's action goes from Aug. 6-17 and the men Aug. 6-18. Pool play begins on Saturday and concludes on Aug. 11.

- The U.S. Olympic Beach Volleyball Team is comprised of four athletes from California, three from Florida and one from Utah. Of those, three went to Pac-12 schools, three to schools in Florida and two in the state of Utah
- It is the first Olympic Games for each current U.S. Olympian to play on a natural beach. The last Olympics to feature a natural beach was Sydney in 2000. Walsh Jennings was then at her first Olympic Games, with the women's indoor team that placed fourth
- There are 16 countries in the men's field, 17 in the women's and a total of 22 different countries playing in the 2016 Games
- All four pairs are new to the quad. They are no longer considered "new teams" or "new partners." Each pair teamed in the quad and went through a grueling qualification season that began in February 2015. The most recent pairing was Phil Dalhausser and Nick Lucena, who teamed up for this Olympics in August of 2015
- Twenty-four two-person teams play, per gender. Of the 96 athletes in the beach competition in 2016, only two have gold medals: USA's Kerri Walsh Jennings and Phil Dalhausser
- Three athletes at the 2016 Olympics have silver medals, including USA's April Ross
- USA's Jake Gibb and Kerri Walsh Jennings are the oldest players in their respective genders at the Olympics in beach volleyball. Gibb is 40 and Walsh Jennings is 37, soon to be 38 on Aug. 15
- Four countries qualified the maximum number of teams allowed, four: Brazil, Canada, Netherlands and United States
- Kerri Walsh Jennings is one of two players in 2016 that is a four-time Olympian on the beach. The other is Spain's Pablo Herrera. Walsh Jennings is at her fifth Olympics, having begun on the indoor side
- The team is split between Olympic newcomers and veterans. Phil Dalhausser and Jake Gibb are at their third Olympics, respectively, April Ross her second and Kerri Walsh Jennings her fifth. Lauren Fendrick, Brooke Sweat, Casey Patterson and Nick Lucena are making their debut
- Against the Olympic field, Kerri Walsh Jennings and April Ross are a staggering 60-17
- The U.S. has won gold at every Olympic beach showing, men or women, since the sports inception in 1996
- USA has won three of the five gold medals in the sports history, for both men and women
- If Kerri Walsh Jennings wins gold, she'll be the third American to win four gold in one event for a team sport. Tamika Catchings of USA Basketball is going for the same record, but the women's beach volleyball gold medal match ends before basketball's at the 2016 Games
- A medal of any color would make Kerri Walsh Jennings the most decorated Olympian all-time in beach volleyball, for either gender. She currently shares that stat with Misty May-Treanor
- The U.S. also has a referee at the Olympics. Dan Apol is the sole American referee on the staff of 16 in beach volleyball
- Russia is in and Italy is out. While the world watches Russia go through major changes to their Rio plans, an unexpected expulsion happened on the beach. Italy's Viktoria Orsi Toth was banned due to a failed drug test, testing positive for clostebol metabolite. Italy brought in Laura Giombini to play with Marta Menegatti

## Beach Volleyball 101

- A set is won by the team which first scores 21 points, with a minimum lead of two points
- In the case of a 20-20 tie, play is continued until a two-point lead is achieved (22-20, 23-21 etc)
- The match is won by the team that wins two sets
- In the case of a 1-1 set tie, the deciding third set is played to 15 points, with a minimum lead of two points
- Teams have one timeout per set
- The ball is in when it touches the surface of the playing court, including the lines
- The ball is out when it falls outside of the lines, touches the antenna, ropes, posts or net outside the bands, crosses completely the lower space under the net, crosses the vertical plane of the net either partially or totally outside the crossing space during service or during the third hit of the team
- A player may enter into the opponent's space, provided that this does not interfere with the opponent's play
- In blocking, a player may touch the ball beyond the net, provided that they do not interfere with the opponent's play, before or during the latter's attack hit
- Teams are made up of two people, there are no substitutions
- Each pair can touch the ball up to three times before returning it over the net
- Any part of the body can be used
- Any part of equipment (hat/clothing) that touches the ball/net while it is on the body, counts as a touch

## Challenges

- The challenge system is for all matches on center court. Teams allowed 2 unsuccessful challenges per set; unlimited successful challenges
- Challenges can be made, within five seconds of end of rally, for the following actions:
  - Ball in/out - for side and end lines
  - Block touch - contact with the ball by the player
    - i. with the ball landing after the block action
    - ii. with the ball remaining in play
  - Net fault - contact with the net between the antenna by the player in the action of playing the ball
  - Antenna touch - contact with the antenna by the player or ball
  - Service foot fault - at the moment of the service hit or take-off for a jump service, the server touches the court (touching the end line or outside the service zone)

## Player Penalties

1. Delays are as a team and for the match, not for the a set. The first delay in a match normally results in a verbal warning, the second delay in a match by either player on a team results in a yellow card warning, any further delays in a match by either player on a team becomes a red card penalty, which results in a point and loss of serve. There is no limit on the number of delays a team can receive in a match.
2. Individual misconduct sanctions are different. Usually the first individual misconduct by either player results in an informal verbal warning (both players may receive), followed by an individual yellow card (IYC) warning. Once an IYC has been assessed to either player in a match, any similar misconduct throughout the match by either player would result in an individual red card penalty (IRC), which is a loss of serve and a point for the opposing team. Each player is limited to two IRC's per set with the third IRC resulting in expulsion, meaning you lose the set.
